This does not allow for shared infrastructure

among communities.




19% of Canadians live in coastal areas. 100% of Nunavummiut live in coastal areas.



37% of Canadian runways are paved. Only 8% of Nunavut runways are paved.



Roads in Nunavut account for less than .1% of all roads in Canada.



There are over 1000 harbours overseen by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans in Canada, but only one in Nunavut.



Only older, smaller aircraft are able
to land on the short gravel runways
of Nunavut. These aircraft are more expensive to
maintain, driving up
costs of shipping food to Nunavut.



40% of Canada's roads are paved. Only 2% of Nunavut's roads are paved. Gravel roads need frequent maintenance and effect air quality.

94.3% of Canadians are employed. Only 79.6% of Inuit are employed.



Marine infrastructure underpins economic development for Nunavut's coastal communities. Lack of marine infrastructure limits local job opportunities.

92% of Canadian households have enough to eat. Only 30% of Inuit households have enough to eat.
